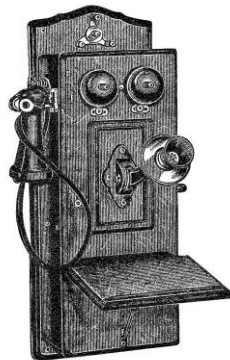
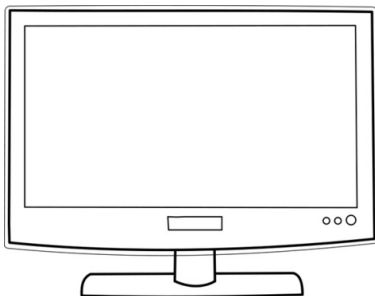
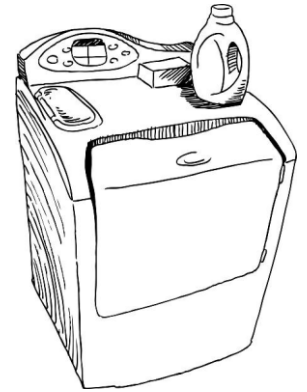
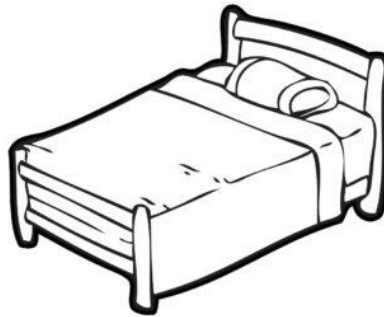
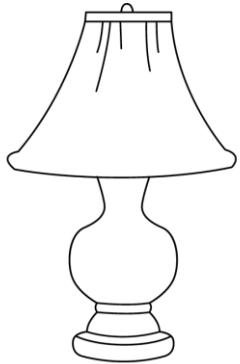
Jimmy Carter's Life

Work Gloves: 50¢ per pair
Shirts: 75¢ each

Gasoline: 20¢ per gallon
Oil: 10¢ per quart
Kerosene: 5¢ per quart

How are these classrooms alike and different ?





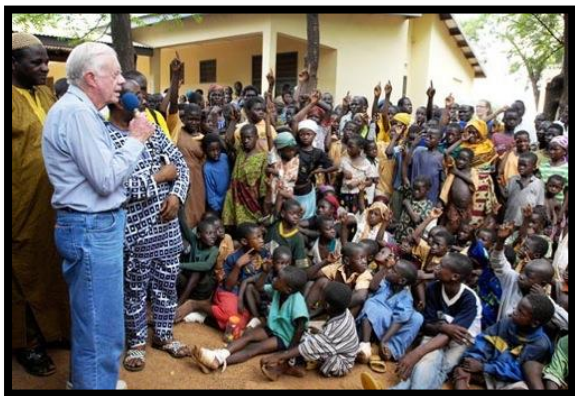
ELAGSE2R19: Compare and contrast important points presented by two versions of the same topic.

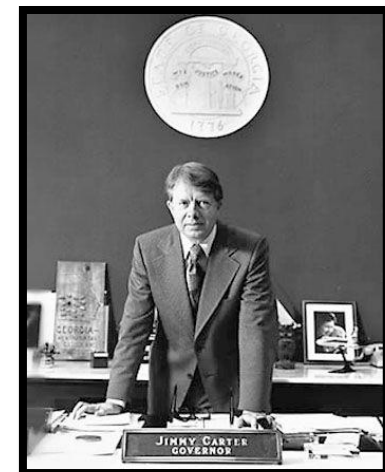
